


### Headteacher's Bulletin


#### **Dear Parents and Carers**,

This week students have been learning more about the Holocaust in assemblies. This year's Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) marks the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi concentration camp complex, and the 30th anniversary of the genocide in Bosnia.

We encourage students to engage with the stories of the individuals affected, including reading poems, watching films, or listening to survivor's words.



80 years on from the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, antisemitism (anti-Jewish hatred) has increased significantly in the UK. It is hoped that that HMD 2025 can be an opportunity for people to come together, learn both from and about the past, and take actions to make a better future for all.



There are many things we can all do to create a better future. We can speak up against Holocaust and genocide denial and distortion; we can challenge prejudice; we can encourage others to learn about the Holocaust and more recent genocides. This Holocaust Memorial Day, we all have an opportunity to take action for a better future. A better future where people are not suffering prejudice or persecution because of their faith, ethnicity or other characteristic.

#### Dear Parents and Carers,

I am writing to you with deep concern regarding the challenges facing children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) in schools across the country and the potential consequences of a proposed funding decision that could have far-reaching impacts.

The decision to transfer 0.5% of funding from the Schools Block to the High Needs Block of the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) for 2025-26 may sound like a small shift, but in reality, it poses significant risks to the quality of education and support available in schools for all children, including those with SEND. While we acknowledge the urgent need to better support children with SEND, this transfer of funds is not the solution. Instead, it will make an already difficult situation worse for schools and families alike.

The 0.5% transfer refers to a reallocation of funds within the Dedicated Schools Grant, which is the main source of funding for schools. The Schools Block provides the essential funding that schools rely on for day-to-day operations, including teaching staff, resources, and support services. The High Needs Block, on the other hand, is intended to support children and young people with SEND, especially those requiring additional resources or specialised placements. While the High Needs Block is critical for supporting SEND pupils, taking funds from the Schools Block reduces the capacity of mainstream schools to provide in-school SEND provision, effectively creating a situation where both funding streams become overstretched.

Former Schools Minister Nick Gibb recently admitted that "we have let down thousands" of SEND children. This admission highlights the systemic challenges in our current education system. Yet, instead of addressing these issues with targeted investment, this decision will take money away from the Schools Block—the core funding that allows schools to run, retain staff, and provide support to all pupils.

To make matters worse, Tom Rees, the government's inclusion tsar, has criticised the way SEND is often treated under a broad and misleading "umbrella" label. This lack of nuance in the system means schools already face difficulties in meeting the unique needs of individual children. Redirecting funds away from schools will leave them with fewer resources to address these needs, and, ultimately, children will suffer the most.

What does this mean for your child?

- Schools will face budget cuts that could lead to job losses, including the reduction of vital specialist SEND staff.
- The level of support available in mainstream schools for children with SEND will decrease as resources are stretched even thinner.
- The overall quality of education for all children will be impacted as schools struggle to manage rising costs alongside declining budgets.
- Indicative figures calculated for Ivanhoe School suggest that this move will remove £50,000 of funding for 2025-26, at a time when we can afford this least.





At a time when national education leaders are calling for greater investment in schools to improve SEND provision, this funding transfer threatens to undermine these efforts. Schools are already under immense financial pressure, and this move will force them to make impossible decisions that will ultimately harm the children they strive to support.

We believe that instead of redistributing existing funding, the government must commit to providing increased investment for both the High Needs Block and the Schools Block. Only with sufficient funding can schools provide the tailored support that children with SEND deserve while maintaining high-quality education for all.

I met with Amanda Hack, our MP for NWL on Saturday, to raise my concerns and share the frustrations around the current funding for SEND students across the county.

As parents and carers, your voice is powerful. I urge you to join us in advocating for fair funding for our schools and children. Reach out to your local representatives, express your concerns, and help us send a clear message: our children deserve better.

Thank you for taking the time to read this letter and for your continued support in ensuring all children receive the education and support they need to thrive.
